Edge activities - summary

In the last year the Edge has maintained its usual series of high level policy debates, has been closely involved with the Government's Green Construction Board and has developed its Research Edge initiative.

The Edge has maintained its links with its sponsor institutions (the RIBA, ICE, CIBSE, IStructE & RICS) and is exploring formal links with the RTPI.

The Edge committee

The Edge 'Committee' continues to meet on a monthly basis with several members achieving additional prominence:

- 1 Lynne Sullivan joined the Green Construction Board as the representative from the Edge. Edge member Sunand Prasad is also a member of the CGB
- 2 Richard Lorch and Bill Bordass of the Edge gave Keynote Addresses to the World Sustainable Building Conference in Helsinki in October 2011
- 3 Andy Ford handed over the Presidency of the Chartered Institute of Building Services Engineers to Professor David Fisk in June 2012
- 4 Rachel Fisher has become Head of Homes and Land at the National Housing Federation
- 5 Dr Dorte Rich Jorgensen has been appointed Royal Academy of Engineering Visiting Professor of Innovation at Heriot Watt University, Edinburgh
- Doug King joined the Edge Committee and since then has been appointed as Chief Science and Engineering Advisor to the Building Research Establishment and elected as a Fellow of The Royal Academy of Engineering.
- 7 Michael Pawlyn/Exploration Architecture's Sahara Forest Project is underway with a pilot facility in Qatar
- 8 Simon Smith has established the new engineering practice, Smith and Wallwork, in Cambridge

In 2012 the Edge welcomed Gary Felgate back onto the committee after a gap of several years. Following his role as Chief Executive of the Energy Retail Association Gary has become a director of Chop-cloc Ltd – the energy innovations company.

Members of the Edge teach and lecture widely, both in the UK and abroad as well as being active professionally in the design and delivery of significant projects across the world



The Edge continues to develop international links, with several members working overseas, corresponding members in many different countries and proposals for new 'sister' Edge groups in various cities around the world.



4 Brokerage

Fundamental to the Edge's work is the idea of linkage and making connections between different disciplines and between the worlds of research, practice and policy-making. In the last year this has, as ever, involved working with the Edge's sponsoring professional institutes, their presidents and senior executives; with government and their advisers and agencies; with think tanks, arms-length delivery bodies and pressure groups.

5 Thinking

The Edge is a thinking organisation, providing a forum for a wide range of industry expertise to come together to address current issues, policy development and emerging ideas, to reconsider previous experience and bring extensive practical knowledge to bear on present problems.

The Edge's focus is the built environment and the professional bodies that work with it; but it has the freedom to think widely and to propose initiatives and policy ideas that address the big picture. It will continue to use its institutional freedom to challenge, to provoke and to influence. Importantly, the Edge's thinking capacity is available to other built environment bodies to help them develop thinking, share ideas, test propositions: a necessary sounding board for the industry only used to dialogue within its own segment.

6 Research Edge

The research Edge is subsidiary group of the Edge working to connect research, practice and policy-making communities in the built environment sector and to promote open access to publicly funded research. There is a particular concern to ensure that information on effective measures to counter and adapt to climate change flows rapidly and effectively between the communities.

The research Edge can provide services, drawing on the knowledge and experience of the Edge family including:

7 Edge connections

8 International Edge
