Edge activities - summary

In the past year the Edge has been busy on a number of fronts including running its debate series and liaising with and briefing an ever-wider range of individuals and organisations, but its main focus has been on its Commission on Future Professionalism, which will report in the Autumn of 2014.

The Commission has meant a high level of engagement over recent months with the Edge's sponsoring professional institutions (CIBSE, CIOB, ICE, IStructE, RIBA, RICS) as well as the Construction Industry Council (CIC). The Edge is delighted that this group has been joined this year by the Society for the Environment (SocEnv).

The Edge has also been very pleased to re-engage with The Ove Arup Foundation, its founding sponsor. The Foundation is generously supporting the Commission of Inquiry along with REHAU. The Edge also continues to maintain strong links with its other sponsor organisations, the UCL Energy Institute and The Building Centre.

The Edge works at the intersection of the construction industry professions, research bodies and policy-making groups inside and out of government. 1 Edge Debate

Holding debates that examine areas of policy-making and developing technical understanding remains the Edge's central activity. Debates examine questions that urgently need airing, but are not necessarily susceptible to easy answers. Edge Debates use an invited expert audience, including senior members of the sponsoring institutions, civil servants, academics and practitioners as well as politicians and influential public figures, to discuss and make sense of pressing issues facing the construction industry and its professions. Over the past year the Edge has run a series of debates aiming, as ever, at challenging the thinking of the construction industry. The main component of the past year's debates has been the five sessions of the Edge Commission of Inquiry on future professionalism – see below – the Commission, which developed out of the Edge's previous work on 'New Professionalism', has focused directly on the Edge's sponsoring organisations, the professional institutions.

The 2014-2015 series of Edge Debates will include the launch of the Commission of Inquiry's findings, further work on developing thinking on the idea of a National Plan and a study into educating for inter-disciplinarity with London South Bank University, as well as individual events on housing, the cost to value equation and tall buildings.

2 Edge Commission of Inquiry on Future Professionalism

Throughout 2014 the Edge has been organising and holding its first Commission of Inquiry on the subject of the future of professionalism within the construction industry and specifically the response of the professional institutions to current and foreseeable challenges. This project continues the work of the Edge on New Professionalism that has been running since 2011.

Paul Morrell OBE, the UK Government's first Chief Construction Adviser (2009-12) agreed to Chair the Commission Panel on which he was joined by Jenny Baster (Arup), Tony Burton (Gardiner & Theobold & Chair of the Construction Industry Council), Isabel McAllister (MACE), Professor Alan Penn (UCL) and Karen Rogers (formerly Heathrow Airports Ltd). The Ove Arup Foundation agreed to sponsor the Commission and the dissemination of its report.

Four evidence-taking sessions were held at The Building Centre from March to May (see above) involving senior representatives of most of the construction industry institutions (CIBSE, CIOB, ICE, IStructE, LI, RAE, RICS, RIBA, RICS and RTPI) as well as several distinguished keynote speakers and, at the last session, a range of speakers representing a new generation of professionals. These events were sponsored by REHAU with support from the Society for the Environment (SocEnv).

In July 2014 a dinner was hosted by the RICS to discuss the issues raised and to brief the Institutions on the key questions suggested by the initial sessions. The Commission will be preparing its report over the summer for publication and further deliberation in the Autumn of 2014.

3 A National Plan

In the face of serious challenges in areas including energy supply, climate stress and capital management, the Edge, along with many other individuals and organisations, is concerned with the short-term nature of the UK's approach to forward planning. In response the Edge is exploring what a National Plan with a ten - or more - year horizon might look like.

The point of the exercise is not to say what should be in the plan but to describe its characteristics and to provide a framework and process for re-establishing the idea of national planning in our political language.

This workstream has been underway for some time and the initial work on the subject underpinned the contribution by Jane Davidson, former Minister for environment and sustainability in Wales and initiator of Wales' national sustainable development strategy, at the Ecobuild Debate in March 2014. In the year ahead the Edge will be holding a series of workshops to develop the thinking behind a new National Plan.

4 Educating for inter-disciplinarity

If the future, as most suspect and many employers are demanding, will be defined by a more mobile workforce, able to cross boundaries and work in many different fields over a career and capable of resolving requirements and integrating inputs from a wide range of disciplines and specialisms to deliver a successful built environment; then how should students be educated for that future?

The Edge is currently exploring these questions with London South Bank University as they bring all their built environment disciplines together into one school. In early 2015 the Edge and LSBU will run a series of workshops and events to explore the question of educating for inter-disciplinarity, culminating in a conference to discuss and evaluate the range of possible approaches

6 Brokerage

Fundamental to the Edge's work is the idea of linkage and making connections between different disciplines and between the worlds of research, practice and policy-making. The Edge works with its sponsoring professional institutes, their presidents and senior executives; with governments and their advisers and agencies; with academic and research organisations; with think tanks, armslength delivery bodies and pressure groups to encourage cross-disciplinary thinking and solution finding.

The Edge is currently supporting the establishment of an independent Institute of Building Performance – an initiative being led by Bill Bordass.

The Edge is backing a Special Issue of Building Research and Information entitled 'Closing the policy gaps: from formulation to outcomes'.

The Edge has contributed to Building Magazine's Agenda15 campaign and is helping Building develop the ideas submitted into a joint construction industry manifesto for the 2015 general election.

Edge member George Adams is co-ordinating policy proposals for the CIC's shared election manifesto with assistance from the Edge.

7 Thinking and Beliefs

The Edge is a thinking organisation, providing a forum for a wide range of industry expertise to come together to address current issues, policy development and emerging ideas; to reconsider previous experience and bring extensive practical knowledge to bear on present problems.

The Edge's focus is the built environment and the professional bodies that work with it; but it has the freedom to think widely and to propose initiatives and policy ideas that address the big picture. It will continue to use its institutional freedom to challenge, to provoke and to influence. Importantly, the Edge's thinking capacity is available to other built environment bodies to help them develop thinking, share ideas, test propositions: a sounding board for the industry only used to dialogue within its own segment.

8 Edge membership

The Edge is developing its membership structure to allow it to strengthen links with a wide range of interested individuals and groups as well as to generate a modest level of regular income. Members can belong to a number of different membership categories:

- <u>Emeritus members</u>: Long-standing Edge members and supporters who are no longer continuously involved in Edge activities. By invitation only.
- Committee members: those who regularly take part in Edge meetings and activities. Over the last year this has included a new, younger group of members. By invitation only. A small annual fee is charged

9 Edge Funding
