the Edge is a multidisciplinary built and natural environment think tank and network with members drawn from across numerous different professions (and beyond). It held its first debate on June 18th 1996.

This report covers the period April 2020 to July 2021

2020-21- Summary

2020-21, despite everything else that been happening, has been a hugely busy period for the Edge. We have held an unprecedented number of debates, roundtables and other discussions and delivered on two other significant projects.

The first of these is the work following-up the multi-institutional agreement in June 2019 at the Climate Action Round Table. Following that meeting the Edge co-ordinated a series of meetings between the professional institutions and the Committee on Climate Change and at our last face-to-face meeting in February 2020 a framework for a cross-industry Climate Action Plan was confirmed. That framework has formed the basis for the plan, developed by the Edge and published by the Construction Industry Council in June 2021 – see page -- below.

The second project has been the 2040 City study developed by the Edge working with the law firm Taylor Wessing and University College of Estate Management (UCEM). The project involved 6 discussion events, 5 of which were open events and the 6th a specialist round table, leading to the City 2040 report on the future of urban planning in UK cities, now available on the Edge's and Taylor Wessing's websites.

Covid times

2020 was an unusual and demanding year for everyone and not least the construction industry. Old lessons had to be unlearnt and new routines and ways of working developed and adopted. Many temporary measures put in place early in 2020 are still with us a year and a half later, while, somehow, a high proportion of business also continued as normal. At times 2020 felt existential, at others just a rehearsal for new crises still to come and sometimes just a distraction. the Edge did its best over 2020-21 to see through and beyond the immediate predicament and to catch glimpses of the bigger picture masked by the evolving tragedy of the pandemic.

The advent of Zoom/Teams has meant that our meetings, debates and consultations have been freed of the usual geographical limitations, allowing a richer dialogue with participants joining them from across the world. 2020-21 has meant both an, at times, global discussion and an international

audience, which we hope we have made the most of as we look forward to the immediacy of holding in-person sessions once again. We have also benefited from the ability in lockdown conditions of holding events at short notice or in series, simply because they were urgent and relevant conversations to have, and they could be planned and executed in a matter of days rather than months. This has given the sessions extra relevance and bite, which we hope has contributed to the wider debates in the industry. We look forward to taking the lessons learnt from this and in particular recognise that the future is hybrid and that the Edge's ways of working will change as a result.

What haven't changed are the extraordinary challenges that we face as a society and an industry. Climate change, biodiversity loss, inequality, homelessness and the gap in performance between what we claim and manage to achieve are combined with a professional system that knows it has to engage but finds it very difficult to do so. Despite our focus on a health and economic emergency these well-recognised challenges are all still with us and progress dealing with them is slow and halting. Since the beginning of 2020 we have all had a brush with an existential threat that has resulted in millions of avoidable deaths. This has been a time to learn and to change – we hope to discover that we as an industry have jointly committed to doing so.

The final events of the old normal were held at Futurebuild in March 2020 where the Edge co-organised a series of events under the overall programe of 'Responding to the Emergency – making the transition to a Zero Carbon World'. These were reported on in our last Annual Report and can be viewed on-demand on the colab professional development site at https://colab-cpd.co.uk. Even then the writing was on the wall, handshakes were replaced by elbow bumps and some speakers presciently started at home. Within a matter of weeks the country was in full lockdown and the Edge's discussions transferred to the ether.

the Edge's activities during the pandemic period fall into a number of areas:

- Futurebuild debates
- Ongoing Edge debates
- Roundtable expert discussions
- The City 2040 project
- The Climate Action Plan
- Consultations and responses



<u>Professional Institutions and other partners</u>

Engagement with our partner organisations has been very different in 2020-21. We haven't been able to sit down with Chief Executives and other senior members of the bodies we normally work with to discuss matters of current concern and areas to engage in. There has been a great deal of meeting online, but the experience hasn't been so effective and we look forward to re-engaging properly in the year ahead. Nonetheless the degree of collaboration we have observed between the institutions and disciplines during 2020-21, especially over issues such as industry recovery and achieving net-zero carbon, has been unprecedented and bodes well for the future.

We are also very pleased to welcome the Chartered Institute of Highways and Transport (CIHT) as the latest Edge partner organisation.

the Edge has issued its second **Institutional Reporting Review** (see https://edgedebate.com/edge-reports) covering the transparency of information made available in institutions' 2019 and 2020 Annual Reports (and occasionally other material). The information has been assessed against the Institutional Best Practice Reporting Standard published in 2019. The result has been a mixed bag with many institutions improving on their previous reporting but with a handful falling back or not reporting at all.



The Edge will continue to work with all parties to ensure that the built and natural design professions and organisations are prepared and better able to deliver net zero carbon solutions.
